

## CV Angela Bogaard

Angela Bogaard (1957) was born in the Netherlands and is a visual artist [and writer] with more than forty years of experience. The influence of the 1980s is clearly present throughout her oeuvre, a period in which art and language were consciously used to bring social issues into focus. Drawing on her artistic practice, enriched by her engagement with family constellations, shamanism, and Taoism, she explores the relationship between personal experience and collective consciousness.

Her visual language centres on themes such as rhythm, orientation, and memory. The figure of the Great Mother Goddess occupies an important place in her work, not as a nostalgic reference, but as a contemporary embodiment of creative power, restoration, and transformation. In this way, Bogaard's work operates at the intersection of activism, spirituality, and mythic thought.

Bogaard began her career as a painter and, over the years, has expanded her practice to include photography, digital techniques, and collage. Text and poetry function as supporting layers that deepen the visual work. In her exhibitions, she invites the audience to move beyond observation alone: her work encourages reflection on each person's place within a broader cultural, historical, and spiritual whole.
